Den Building

- Using sheets, towels, fabrics etc. help the children to create a den
- Just simply throwing a sheet over a table or a couple of chairs can create a lovely cosy space
- Let your children decide how they want to use their new special space with you:
 - Is it a story-telling space?
 - Does it need cushions and pillows added to it?
 - Do you need to use pegs to hold the fabric?
 - Could you add Christmas lights?
 - Is it a space for building creations together e.g. duplo or lego?
 - Are they imagining it's a rocket, a train, or a flying tent etc could you make up a story together?
 - Could you all squeeze in there for a picnic lunch?
 - Could you remind and practise pretend hand-washing techniques together?
 - Or is it just a lovely cosy space to quietly lie in together and have a cuddle?
 - Take photos to look back at and chat about the special times spent together

Toddlers will be thrilled with being in a small cosy 'new' space and older children will love experimenting with their creative and imaginative den-making skills – just be mindful of health and safety as some children can get quite adventurous with their den creations.





Household Routines - fun doing the laundry

It is never too late to involve children in the life-skill of carrying out household routines. With all the extra pairs of hands at home, get them involved in the laundry.

- Explain what the process is with putting the washing in the machine, measuring out the soap into the dispenser and choosing which setting and why
- Look at the washing going round and round chat about what you can smell, see and hear it's fascinating for young children to watch the washing and soapy water going round slowly, fast and then stopping repeatedly can be strangely fascinating for you too!
- Have fun sorting the laundry when dry. Have a go at 'Find the Matching Sock', practising their early maths skills by sorting socks by colour, size and owner and watch the children concentrate on finding the pairs
- If you have space for a washing line set one up with a piece of string and let the children have a go at pegging the laundry on it – praise their successes as managing pegs is a real skill for little hands

Always be mindful of health and safety as items like washing powders, capsules, liquids and string can be a severe hazard to children.

• Take photos to look back at and chat about the laundry process again.

Everyday activities, which may be tedious for adults, can be a source of great interest to young children. It may take longer to carry out but it is time well spent...and most of us are experiencing having a lot of time right now.









Listening and Looking 'I - Spy' Game

This 'I-Spy' game can be done indoors as well as outdoors by just looking through an open window.

As you know, children will need to be supervised at open windows and never to lean out.

Give the children a little time to listen and look around and then ask them if they can hear or see any of the following:

You can always add other objects depending on what you can see from your windows. For older children make the challenge harder by asking them to identify different cars, birds, trees etc.

Finish off the game with everyone drawing a picture of what they saw – have a go yourself!
